Eye Concerns

There are many different causes of pink eye or an eye with yellow discharge. Most of the causes are self resolving or can be treated with a short course of eye drops. The following is a list of common causes for a pink eye or an eye with goopy, yellow discharge. CALL YOUR DOCTOR IF: Swelling around the eye, eye is bulging outward (proptosis), the eye is painful when you touch or move it, there is history of trauma to the eye, there is no improvement with treatment after 48hours, fever, your child is acting sick.

Infection ("conjunctivitis" or "pink eye")

Cause: Viral Infection Symptoms:

- · White of the eye looks pink or red
- · Little to no discharge from eye
- May have other viral symptoms such as runny nose, cough, nasal congestion, or fever

Treatment:

- None
- Keep eye clear by gently washing with water and cotton balls
- Self-resolves. Antibiotics will not help the eye get better any faster

Cause: Bacterial Infection (The bacteria is often introduced when a child rubs their eyes)

Symptoms:

- · White of the eye looks very red and bloodshot
- · Yellow, goopy discharge

Treatment:

- Antibiotic eye drops
- Wash eyes with warm compresses/cotton balls
- Although bacterial conjunctivitis needs to be treated with antibiotics, it is usually not an emergency

Contagiousness:

- Both bacterial & viral conjunctivitis are very contagious and are passed by direct contact
- Once your child is on eye drops for 24 hours and is better, s/he may return to school

Prevention:

- · Thorough hand washing or use of Purell
- Avoid rubbing eyes
- · Use different face towels and pillow cases

Allergic

Symptoms:

- White of the eye is pink with watery discharge
- Itchy eyes
- · May have other signs of allergies such as nasal
- congestion, dark circles under eyes, nose rubbing.

Treatment:

- Allergy eye drops such as Patanol
- Oral non-drowsy anti-histamines such as Claritin or Zyrtec

Dacrostenosis (clogged tear duct)

Cause:

- Clogged tear duct- common in newborns & infants in the
- first year of life
- · Tear ducts run from the corner of the eyes (nearest to
- our nose) down the side of the nose and empty both into
- the eyes and the nose. That is why you may have a runny
- · nose when you cry. In infants, the tear duct is often not
- · fully open and can back-up

Symptoms:

- · Yellow, goopy discharge from eyes (eyes may be glued
- shut when waking up from sleep)
- · The white of the eye is not pink or red
- Eyelids may be a little red from the irritation of the discharge or from wiping the eye.

Treatment:

- Massage. Massage the tear duct by rubbing your little finger up & down along the duct to help push out the obstruction and open the duct. When you do this, you may actually see discharge expressed into the corner of the eye.
- Warm compresses. Gently wipe the eye with a warm
- · compress to remove the sticky discharge.

Overflow

Cause: Since the eyes and nose are connected, any child with nasal congestion may develop eye discharge as well.

Symptoms:

- Yellow discharge from the eyes (the discharge may be worst when waking from sleep)
- · The white of the eye is not pink or red
- Nasal congestion or runny nose

Treatment: None
